### MORE COMFORTS FOR RURAL HOMES.

The promotion of home comforts in the rural homes is the subject of a very interesting article in the University News, Letter of November 26th.

The bureau of extension of the University and the State Highway Commission are working together to encourage the installation of rural water supplies, telephone facilities and electrical plants.

The engineering department of the University will make investigations to ascertain what natural water power possibilities there are in different sections and will prepare plans for their development and for the installation of the other conveniences.

Not only is it the idea to encourage the installation of ordinary conveniences but to develop the use of power plants on the farms whereby the constantly increasing shortage of labor can be offset. The services of the engineering department and the advice of its experts who will carry on the investigations will be without charge to the individual farmer who seeks their help.

While many of the more progressive farmers have already availed themselves of the opportunity to install modern comforts and conveniences the great rank and file have not, although they are amply able to do so. The plan as set forth by the bureau of extension of the University should result very successfully in accomplishing its aims and is but another instance of the growing usefulness of the University as its extension department develops.

The conditions existing at Ellis Island, America's great receiving gate for immigrants, if as represented in the preliminary investigation of the congressional committee, are anything but encouraging and promising. That the former commissioner in charge of the island should have been so manifestly in sympathy with the rods raises the question how did such an off color appointee get by the confirmation stage? Surely his leanings must have been altered or else he kept them under cover prior to his selection for the important post.

The spirit manifested by the railroad brotherhoods in considering the proposal of Director-General Hines for a wage increase seems to flavor of the right sort. No strike vote was taken or ordered, said one of the general chairmen after the Cleveland conference and the appointment of a committee and request for a conference with Director-General Hines is evidence that the railroad men are anxious to arrive at an amicable adjustment of their wage differences.

Every real Tar Heel rejoices in the prowess of the Carolina football team which won the big battle of the 1919 season at Chapel Hill Thursday over their old-time rivals from Virginia. Whatever criticism may be hurled at athletics and football especially, there is no question but that the morale of an institution is boosted by successful participation in intercollegiate contests and the esprit de corps is stimulated and developed thereby.
