Georgia Convention.
Atlanta, Jan. 25.—The Convention has decided that 50 dollars be paid to the editor of the Herald for the \$10,000 re-imbursed expenses.
Additional sections of the bill of rights of which were of a novel character were adopted.
The committee on finance reported that they had had an interview with Gen. Grant for the loan of a certain amount of the funds sent by the State of Georgia to pay its indebtedness to the Government on the Western and Atlantic Railroad, to defray all the expenses of the Convention, and that Gen. Grant accepts the proposition so far as his power extends, and will answer definitely to-day if possible. Should this proposition fail, he will direct Governor Ruger immediately to ascertain upon what terms the money can be procured from the parties in Savannah. A resolution was adopted approving the plans of the Committee for procuring money.
Three candidates for Governor under the new Constitution, if ratified, have been nominated.

THE PRESIDENT WILL "PEEP."
The World's telegram says:
"It is learned that the President has expressed himself to-day in the most positive manner respecting the revolutionary measures now being put through Congress. If Congress so enacts as to deprive him of any portion of his constitutional authority, the Executive who was as directly elected by and as directly represents the people as Congress was or does, may be expected to resist such an encroachment with all the power at his command. His right and duty as commander-in-chief of the army, of which it is proposed to deprive him in the pending reconstruction bill, are among the chief prerogatives which Mr. Johnson will consistently defend."

THURSDAY, Jan. 23, 1868.—Mr. McDonald, of Chatham, a resolution appealing to Congress to advance money to our Railroads, to be replaced with interest, R-referred.

Mr. Duckworth, resolution instructing the Committee on Education to consider and report, as a part of the Constitution, that there shall be levied a Poll Tax for Educational purposes, not exceeding one dollar. R-referred.

RICHMOND, Jan. 25.—The habeas corpus case before Judge Underwood to test the Constitutionality of reconstruction, was to-day adjourned till Wednesday.
The Commandant of Libby prison produced the prisoner, and made his return that he was held by order of Gen. Schofield, under authority of the reconstruction acts. The prisoner was represented by four prominent lawyers, all members of the Conservative State Central Committee, which body brings the case up with the intention of carrying it to the Supreme Court.
