> A dispatch from Waterbury, Conn., to the New York World, gives the following information about raising potatoes, both above and below ground: Samuel Wilson, of Wolcott, itches. Those above ground grow from four to eight on a plant, one at the base of each leaf) Food experts report the hybrid to be far more nutritious than the Irish or sweet potato and much more easily grown.


