The great essential to us happiness and prosperity is that we adhere to the principles amon which the Government was established and insist upon their fulthful observation. By the Fresident of the United States of America. A Proclamation. Whereas public interests require that the Congress of the United States should be convened in extra session at 12 oxfook.

gress of the United States, should be convened in extra session at 12 o clock on the 15th day of March, 1897, to receive such communications as may be deemed proper by the Executive.

Now, therefore, I, William McKinley, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim and declare that an extraordinary occasion requires the Congress of the United States to convene in extra session at the Capitol in the city of Washington on the 15th day of March, 1897, at 12 o clock, of which all persons who shall at that time be entitled to act as members thereof are hereby required to take notice.
