Senator Hill, whom Grover beat for the nomination for President, is retreating by defeating Grover's nominees. The Republicans in the senate with their characteristic shrewdness, kindly lend a helping hand to anything which will create a breach in the Democratic ranks.

The signs of reviving business multiply in all parts of the land every week says the Florida Citizen. From every manufacturing town in Alabama came news during January of the resumption of work in plants which had been idle in many cases for months.

The Chicago Mail pertinently says that there is no such thing as overproduction. What seems to be due to overproduction is really due to lack of facilities for exchange. An illustration is to be seen in the fact that today the silver producers lack flour and the wheat producers lack silver.

THE President, with a head of his own, has been defeated three times in important nominations, to wit, Moonlight, Hornblower and Peckham, and still does not seem to see, or care either, that he is widening the breach between the Democratic party and the administration.

Our representative in Congress, Mr. Crawford, it is said, made a very able speech on the Wilson tariff bill when it was pending in the House.
