Capt. Buck Opens His Mouth Again.

Capt. Buck Kitchen was very talkative at Monroe on the 9th inst., and in talking he opened his mouth very wide. He repeated to us we are informed what he said in the presence of Sheriff Edington at Smithfield to wit: "that he now saw that he had made a great big mistake but it was too late to reconsider."

He said further that he was in favor of the present system of county government, and declared the reason they did not live in Halifax county was because there was not a decent white Republican in the county to fuse with, and they did not care to be fooling with the negroes.

Train Robbery in Virginia. A band of robbers boarded an express train on the Richmond, Fredericksburg & Potomac railroad on the night of Oct. 13th, and compelled the fireman and engineer to leave the train, terrified the passengers, entered the express car and rifled the express pouches, securing about \$150,000.
