Egyptian Observer: A large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the market house Monday night in the interest of the co-operative cotton mill. The committee who had solicited subscriptions to the co-operative cotton factory reported 900 shares at \$50 each as having been subscribed.

Reports continue to arrive showing that the pillaging and burning of Armenian villages in Anatolia, especially in the village of Van, is going on as though the Sultan issued no orders to the authorities to stop it, and despite the official declaration that order has been restored everywhere excepting Zaitoun.

The prevailing opinion, among those who profess to know, is that congress is going to do nothing. If this proves true what excuse can Pearson, Pritchard, and the rest of the crew, make to their Populist friends? They have control and have promised free coinage, sub-treasury etc., and we are anxiously awaiting the passage of all of these measures. We hope, you even more, that congress is not going to make good its promises; then, according to their own doctrine, they should be kicked into outer darkness. "Let them be kicked."

The whole of the North Carolina delegation, Democrats, Republicans and Populists have joined in recommending Congressman Pearson for a place on the committee of Foreign Affairs for which he is highly fitted. He was appointed by President Grant as a consul to Verviers and Liege. He is a grandson of John Williams who was representing Tenn. in the Senate when President Monroe wrote his famous message, and was the bearer of the famous doctrine to the states of Nicaragua and Honduras. Mr. Pearson is a nephew of Lewis Williams, who was among the first to be called "The Father of the House."

We are glad to know that some of our Republican friends are now beginning to see the error of their way and are willing to line up with the Democrats in demanding an open field in the markets of the world, to purchase their raw materials, unhampered by any legislation enacted in favor of "infant" industries. Republicans in the west, where wool growing is an extensive industry, are asking for a protective duty on wool, but to offset this, the Republicans of the New England states, are clamoring for all raw materials to be put on the free list and demanding that wool stay where it is.

Senator Frye, of Maine, voices the demand in the introduction of a bill for the revision of our tariff laws so that all raw materials used in the construction of ships be allowed to come in free. We will be glad to see this measure pass, as a high tariff on all ship supplies, inaugurated by the Republicans, has practically debarred our citizens from ship building as an industry and as our merchants cannot purchase foreign made vessels, we have been degraded from a first rate nation, in the carrying trade to a nation that is almost wholly dependent on other countries for the transportation of our freight etc.

We know that the senselessness of a low tariff would be appreciated when once it was given a trial, but we were surprised to see an endorsement of the Democratic principles of free trade, come from Senator Frye, it has been diametrically opposed to the teachings of his party. We like to see a man willing to stand by his convictions, even though he may have to change his policy; and we can cordially congratulate Senator Frye on the light that has broken through the dense clouds, that have surrounded his intellect.

Rev. John E. White.

One of the most successful young preachers in North Carolina is Rev. John E. White who succeeds Dr. Durham as corresponding secretary of the Baptist State Convention. This is the highest position in that great denomination. The incumbent has supervisory charge of all the mission points in the State, of all Sunday school work, and is leader in virtually all the conventional movements of the church. He attends all the associations and in many ways is given chief place.

Mr. White is a very young man for a place of such responsibility. He was born in Clayton Dec. 19th, 1868. His father, Rev. J. M. White, is a well known minister of the gospel, and his grandfather, Rev. John F. Ellington, was a preacher of great usefulness in his day. Mr. White comes of preacher stock on both sides of the house. After graduating at Wake Forest in 1890, he taught in Edgecombe county. In 1891 he was ordained to the ministry in the Baptist church, and preached for some months in the mountains. His first regular call was to the parsonage of the Wilson church, where he won all hearts by his earnest speech and faithful ministrations. His only other charge has been Edenton, which church he has served with great success for two or three years. Under his ministry there have been more than one hundred accessions. Mr. White was married in 1892 to Miss Effie Guess, daughter of Capt. H. P. Guess, of Cary.

The election of Mr. White has been received with pleasure throughout the State, the leaders of the Baptist denomination agreeing that the choice is a wise one. Young, consecrated, full of vigor and endurance; a Baptist by inheritance and choice; loving his denomination with a zeal that makes itself felt wherever he goes; manly, courageous and hopeful, Mr. White enters upon his new duties with every prospect of making himself one of the strongest religious forces in the commonwealth.—News and Observer.

HE FOUGHT FOR HIS LIBERTY.

An Escaped Convict Converts His House Into a Fort.

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Dec. 10.—(Special.)—Yesterday Special State Agent J. A. Perry, of Morganton, and posse surrounded the house of John Lyda, an escaped convict, in Henderson county, to arrest him and carry him back to the penitentiary. Lyda fired through the window, the bullet striking Perry in the shoulder and seriously wounding him. Friends of Lyda ran to the scene and a battle was imminent, but finally Lyda surrendered upon threat that the house would be burned over his head. Lyda was brought to jail here. Perry is in the Mission Hospital. Lyda was sentenced in 1888 for ten years as accessory to a killing in Henderson county. He escaped in 1893.

Mr. Peckham Will be Confirmed

THE SENATE FAVORS THE NOMINATION. The Senate Committee on the Judiciary this morning, (December 9th) on motion of Mr. Hill, of New York, directed a favorable report to be made on the nomination of Rufus W. Peckham, of New York, to be Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States.

There was little discussion of the nomination of Mr. Peckham, Mr. Hill stating that he was perfectly satisfied with the nomination; that if he had been called upon to select he could not have made a better choice.

Mr. Hill opposed the nomination of Mr. Horablower partly because he was in favor of Hon. R. W. Peckham.

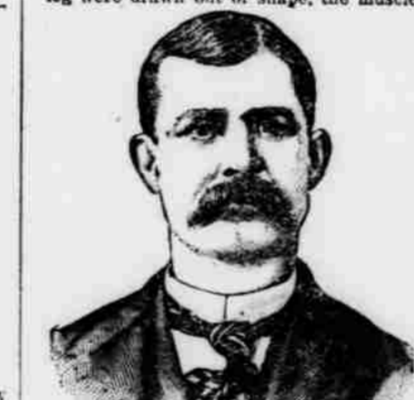
