At the time of going to press early this morning definite arrangements for the funeral services had not been made, but it is expected that the services will be conducted from the residence Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

COUNTY AFFAIRS

Contract Let for Bridge—List Takers and Jurors Appointed—School Tax Election Ordered.

The board of county commissioners was in session Monday and Tuesday, all the members being present. Besides attending to routine business, which consisted chiefly in paying the county bills for the past month, three road petitions were granted, a special school tax election ordered, contract let for a steel bridge, jurors appointed for special term of court, tax listers appointed, and an order passed to prohibit tent shows, or carnivals from exhibiting in McDowell county.

The road petitions granted call for certain changes to be made in the public road in Old Fort township from the junction of the Crooked Creek road leading up the north side of the Catawba river for a distance of three-fourths of a mile, and for changes in the road leading from Old Fort down the Catawba river to the forks of the Marion and Greenlee road at the Reid place. The other petition calls for the establishment of a public road in Nebo township near W. A. Conley's on the north side of the river.

The road leading from the Dysartville-Marion road, which was recently built, was accepted and the superintendent was authorized to appoint overseers and allot to said road.

An important feature of the meeting was the awarding of the contract for the erection and construction of a steel bridge across the Catawba river near Nebo. The contract was awarded to the Carolina Engineering company, of Burlington, for the sum of \$3,850.

The contract for building a public road in Bracketts township was let to George Rhom and Bulow Watkins for the sum of \$190.

On petition of the citizens, a Special School Tax election was ordered in District No. 3, Marion township, June 1st, with J. C. Pool as registrar, and B. L. McKelvey and C. A. Stroud, judges.

The board went on record as opposed to carnival or tent shows when an order was passed Tuesday ordering the sheriff not to issue license hereafter to any street or tent shows or carnivals to exhibit in McDowell county. This order does not apply to large circuses or pony and dog shows.

List takers were appointed for their respective townships to list all taxable property of McDowell county for the year 1910, as follows:

The list takers are requested to meet with the board on Tuesday after the first Monday in June.
