Catawba, July 21.—A mild sensation was created here Tuesday While several ladies were cleaning and rearranging the interior of the Methodist church, they found a stack of papers which they decided to destroy. In removing it one of the ladies saw a package that she was prompted to investigate. An Atlanta Constitution and Asheville Citizen, bearing date of October, 1907, were unrolled, in the folds of which a large number of sheets of postage stamps, of several denominations (mostly 2c) were revealed.
