Gumtion on the Farm.

All sorts of odd jobs are in order now; and get the whitewash brush ready to flip.

Sow cloverseed twice to be sure it will take, and don't forget the alsike along with the red.

It is too late when the stack has tumbled and smothered your best cow to regret not having fenced it off.

Get any extra plow-points or other fixtures you may need, before you get out the plow for the spring work.

Never run for an office; better to so comport yourself and so conduct your affairs that your neighbors will set the office running after you.

If you have any iron or other metal roofs take a comfortable spell and paint them. Get all such jobs out of the way before something else begins to crowd you.

Are patches in the yard bare of grass? After the first thaw sprinkle some Kentucky blue-grass on them and rake in when ground gets dry enough. A little white clover, too.

To renew worn meadows without plowing it, give it a thorough harrowing, so that the carpet of sod is well torn to bits, then top-dress heavily, sow grass seed, and harrow and brush smooth. This is especially true of land that is shallow and stony and hard to plow. Land that is full of knolls and hollows. The process levels and improves such surfaces.

It pays to go down to the city and work up a trade for the farm produce. Hunt up customers for the butter, eggs, apples, potatoes, cabbage and all such stuff. Have a regular market day when you can always be found there. Folks will expect you and depend on you. They will pay you cash and as good prices as they would have to pay at the store, because they get better weight and measure and fresher produce.

The Leighton, Ala., News puts the case this way: "When cotton was six or seven cents a pound and other farm products were correspondingly low it took the price of two turkeys to pay for one year's subscription, now one turkey will sell for enough to pay for three years or more. Then it took ten dozen eggs to pay for one year; now two dozen will almost do it. Then we could buy a little pig with a year's subscription; now it will scarcely pay for the grunt. And so on with almost all farm products you can name."
