Negro Shoots Show Man.

The only occurrence to mar the pleasures of the three days fair was the shooting of William Cheatom, who was running one of the concession shows on Main street. The accident occurred Thursday night about 9 o'clock when the streets were crowded and created the wildest kind of disorder for a little while. Ed Rutherford, a Marion negro, is in jail charged with the crime.

Rutherford had had some words with the show man just a few minutes prior to the shooting and he being drunk on cocaine or some other drug was asked more than once by Mr. Cheatom to get away and let others take his place. He did go away but returned to the booth a few minutes later and shot him from the rear, the bullet striking just above the pivot point of the jaw bone on the right hand side of the face, knocking out three teeth, passing through his tongue and coming out of his mouth. Rutherford was captured in a very few minutes and lodged in jail.

Mr. Cheatom is in a Knoxville hospital and it is thought that he will soon be out again. The officials, however, are keeping in close touch as to his condition, and the negro charged with the crime will be held until such information is had that will justify his further confinement or release on bond.
