CONDITIONS ON THE FARM

Summary of Report of Commissioner of Labor and Printing.

Raleigh, Nov. 9.—For his forthcoming annual report, giving a survey of the development and progress of manufacturing and industry generally in this State, Commissioner of Labor & Printing M. L. Shipman has prepared the following significant summary for the chapter devoted to farming and farm labor:

From a general survey of the farming industry the conditions would indicate that the farmers are devoting much more forethought to their work than ever before. Seed selections and improved methods of cultivations are coming into their proper share of study and investigation, with the result that the amount of crops from a given area are larger than formerly. Along the same line, though not to quite the same extent, attention is being paid to the improvement of appropriate animals and stock for the farm. While it may be said that farm stock has improved as much as methods of cultivation, it is believed that the improvement of stock and animals has been made with a view of improvement along, rather than from a study of needs and special fitness. It would seem from observation of this phase that there is yet doubt as to just what particular breeds are best suited for the needs of the farmers in this State. This applies especially to horses, cattle and hogs. Sheep and goats are not raised extensively, though some and increasing attention is being paid to sheep. Poultry-raising is in nearly all cases a side line, though there would seem to be excellent opportunity for the development of this industry on a commercial scale. The improved breeds of poultry are mostly in the hands of fanciers who breed for show purposes and at such cost as to make their sale at market prices not profitable. The principal proportion of poultry finding its way to market is of the nondescript variety, and even of this there is scarcely enough to supply the demand. This condition holds, it appears, throughout the year.

A TIMELY ANNOUNCEMENT

The State Comes to the Front in Combatting Diphtheria—The Cities and Counties Should Now Do Their Part.

The announcement has just been made by the director of the State Laboratory of Hygiene, under the control of the State Board of Health, that diphtheria antitoxin will now be furnished to all legal residents of North Carolina at the following prices:

1,000 units	\$0.50
3,000 units	1.35
5,000 units	1.95

Formerly diphtheria antitoxin seemed to be under the control of a few manufacturers who were more interested in accumulating fortunes of their own than they were in the public health, and hence the public was obliged to pay prices from 300 to 400 per cent higher than those above quoted. Arrangements have just been made whereby diphtheria antitoxin is now distributed from over a hundred different places throughout the State, and other distributing agencies are constantly being added. At present, fresh antitoxin may be secured by your family physician at the above prices, as he has already been provided with a list of the distributing agencies.

According to Osler and other medical authorities, no deaths occur from diphtheria when antitoxin is used in the early stages of the disease. In other cases the use of antitoxin reduces mortality rate to one-sixth or one-eighth of the rate where no antitoxin is used. It therefore appears that to secure the best results, antitoxin should be administered when the disease is first apparent. Severe sore throat should be regarded with strong suspicion, particularly if not improved after 24 to 30 hours.

Antitoxin is now given in what is called immunizing or preventive doses when a person has been, or is liable to be, exposed to diphtheria, and in curative doses when the disease has become established.

This action on the part of the State leaves but one thing more to be desired in combatting diphtheria. Since this disease is readily communicable and since the cost of antitoxin and the services of a physician make it more likely that children of the poor will be the greatest conveyors of the disease, it would seem that diphtheria antitoxin should be provided free to all. In several States this has been done, with the result that the case rate as well as the death rate has decreased remarkably. But since our State has felt itself unable to provide sufficient funds for such work, it now remains for the various counties and towns to say whether they will or will not step to the front and provide free diphtheria antitoxin for all, or at least for their needy poor.
