Raleigb, Nov. 9.- For his forthoming annual report, giviog a survey of the development and progress of manufactaring and inmissioner of Labor \& Printing M. L. Shipman has prepered th following significant summary for the chapter devoted to farming and farm labor:

From a general survey of the farming industry the conditions would indicate that the farmers are deroting mueh more forethought to their work than ever bafore. Seed selections and improved methods of cultivations are coming into their proper share of study and investigation, with the result that the amount of crops from a given area are larger than formerly. Along the same line hough not to quite the same exrent, attention is being paid to the mprovement of appropriate ani mals and stock for the farm. Whit t may be said that farm stock has mproved as much as methods o cultivation, it is believed that the mprovement of stock and animal has been made with a view of im provemt aloog, rather than from tudy of needs and special fitness. It would seem from observation of this phase that there is yet doubt as to just what particular breeds are best suited for the needs of the farmers in this State. This applies especially to horses, cattle and
hogs. Sheep and poats are not raised extensively, though some and increasing attention is being paid to sheep. Poultry-raising is
in nearly all cases a side line, though neariy ailcases a side be,
there would seem to be excellent opportunity for the development of this industry on a commercia scale. The improved breeds pouitry are mostly in the hands of
fanciers who breed for sho poses and at such cast so to pur their sale at market as mat profitable. The principal propor tion of poaltry finding its wav to market is of the nondescript va

Combatting Diphtheria-The Cit-
ies and Counties Should Now Do Their Part.
The annouucement has just been nade by the director of the State Laboratory of Hygiene, under the ontrol of the State Board of Health, that diphtheria antitoxin will now be furnished to all legal residents of North Carolina at the following prices:

According to Oslar and other nedical authorities, no deaths ocis used in the early stages of the disease. In other cases the use of antitoxin reduces mortality rate to where no antitoxin is used. It therefore aptears that to secure the best results, antitoxin should be administered when the disease is first apparent. Severe sore throat should be regarded with strong

Antitoxin is now given in wha is called immunizing or preventive doses when a person has been, or is liable to be, exposed to diphthe. ria, and in curative doses when the disease has become established.
This action on the part of the State leaves but one thing more to be desired in combatting diphtheria. Since this disease is readily communicable and since the cost of antitoxin and the services of a phy sician make it more likely tha children of the poor will be the greatest convesors of the disease, it would seem that diphtheria antitoxin shoald be provided free to all. In several States this has been done, with the result that the case rate as well as the death rate has decreased remarkably. But since our State has felt itself unable to provide sufficient funds for such work, it now remains for the various counties and cowns to sas whether they wil orwil tot ste to the front add provide free diph-
theria antitoxin for all, or at least for their needy poor.
