Brief Record of Happenings of General Interest During the Past Week.

Greensboro contemplates building a \$200,000 tourist hotel in the near future.

Statesville's merchants have gotten together and established every first Monday as sales day.

The Lumberton Robesonian says that in commenting on the report of the grand jury, Judge Carter said that "in Robeson county, with its 50,000 inhabitants, there have been more homicides during the first five years than have occurred in the Dominion of Canada with its 6,000,000 inhabitants during the same period."

The North Carolina Baptist State Convention will meet at Winston-Salem December 5-10. One of the most important things that will come before the body will be the raising of \$100,000 endowment for Meredith College at Raleigh; continued on the raising of this \$100,000 is a gift of \$50,000 from Mr. John D. Rockefeller.

Another up-to-date tourist hotel to cost \$250,000 is proposed for Asheville. According to the present plans it is to be built by Dr. E. W. Grove, of Asheville and St. Louis, with the aid of the bankers of the city. The hotel is to be built on the side of Sunset Mountain and will command one of the finest landscape views in Western North Carolina.
