North Uarolina paid the federal government for the fiscal year 1911 in excess of the amount of reverue received by the state from the
federal government, $\$ 5,962,87660$. The tocal receipts from the state, derived from internal revenue, corporation tax and miscellaneous was \$7,316,977.18.
Disbursements made by the ne ional government to the state for public buildings, customs, interna revenue, life-saving service, public health and marine hospital service essay office at Charlotte and rivers and harbors amounted to only $\$ 1$, $354,100.58$.
The above information was furn shed by Assistant Secretary of the Treasurer Bailey at the request o Senator Overman, who wanted to know just how the balance shee between the state and federal gov ervment stands. The result shows that the state is not being burden d with appropriations from the federal goyernment.
Damage Suit Against the Southern of Unusual Interest
The suit brought against the outhern railway by Josephine Stewart and Cora Stewart, ha been transferred from McDowel Superior Court to the United States ourt at Asheville.
The contention of the plaintiffs, says the Asheville Gazette-News i that they were in the passenger depot at Morganton with the inten tion of boarding a train for Mari n, and while in the waiting room they were approathed and insulted by some men: that the ticket agen refused to interfere or open a doo by which they might escape. They contended that they were imprison ed and forced to take the insults, and for this they ask damages in the sum of $\$ 10,000$ each.

Costs Pretty Sum to Maintain Army Washington Dispatch: From th battle of Manila Bay, May 1, 1898 until the beginning of the current scal year of July 1, 1911, the rand aggregate expenditures for the support of the army and the maintenance of the War Depart ment was $\$ 1,896,893,428.85$.
This covers all the expenses of the afmy and the expenditure on river and harbor work, which is done under the supervision of the army, as well as the maintenance of the general civil establishment f the War Department, claims of one kind and another, and such bings. It does not include expenditures for the Panama Canal, which the army is constructing, or the Interior Department.
