LITTLE MONEY FOR STATE

Only \$1,354,100.58 Received for Public Buildings, Customs, Internal Revenue, Etc.

North Carolina paid the federal government for the fiscal year 1911 in excess of the amount of revenue received by the state from the federal government, \$5,962,876 60. The total receipts from the state, derived from internal revenue, corporation tax and miscellaneous was \$7,316,977.18.

Disbursements made by the national government to the state for public buildings, customs, internal revenue, life-saving service, public health and marine hospital service, essay office at Charlotte and rivers and harbors amounted to only \$1,354,100.58.

The above information was furnished by Assistant Secretary of the Treasurer Bailey at the request of Senator Overman, who wanted to know just how the balance sheet between the state and federal government stands. The result shows that the state is not being burdened with appropriations from the federal government.

Damage Suit Against the Southern of Unusual Interest.

The suit brought against the Southern railway by Josephine Stewart and Cora Stewart, has been transferred from McDowell Superior Court to the United States court at Asheville.

The contention of the plaintiffs, says the Asheville Gazette-News is that they were in the passenger depot at Morganton with the intention of boarding a train for Marion, and while in the waiting room they were approached and insulted by some men: that the ticket agent refused to interfere or open a door by which they might escape. They contended that they were imprisoned and forced to take the insults, and for this they ask damages in the sum of \$10,000 each.

Costs Pretty Sum to Maintain Army

Washington Dispatch: From the battle of Manila Bay, May 1, 1898, until the beginning of the current fiscal year of July 1, 1911, the grand aggregate expenditures for the support of the army and the maintenance of the War Department was \$1,896,893,428.85.

This covers all the expenses of the army and the expenditure on river and harbor work, which is done under the supervision of the army, as well as the maintenance of the general civil establishment of the War Department, claims of one kind and another, and such things. It does not include expenditures for the Panama Canal, which the army is constructing, or for pensions, which are handled by the Interior Department.

State News.

Sweet potato farmers are beginning to hunt barrels and crates in which to ship their last year's crop of potatoes. With all other food-stuff selling so high, there ought to be a good demand for the Catawba county potatoes at or around \$1.00 a bushel.—Newton Enterprise.

The titles to lands in Western Carolina that are to become a part of the government's Appalachian forest reserve, are being traced in the office of the secretary of state at Raleigh by Geo. D. Wright, of Asheville, for the legal branch of the United States department of agriculture. The lands being traced as to title just now are 18,000 acres in McDowell county, the contracts for which the government has already closed.

FOWLS FOR EGG PRODUCTION

Good, Strong, Vigorous Birds Are Required and Should Not Lay Many Eggs in Pullet Year.

Good, strong, vigorous birds are essential for egg production. The simple fact that a hen has laid 200 or more eggs in her pullet year is not sufficient to warrant her being used as a breeder. I have seen a number of 200-egg hens, with long, narrow

heads and sunken eyes, which indicate low vitality, and, moreover, have tested a number of them as breeders, and have yet to see one that was worth while breeding from, judging from the performance and living powers of her offspring, says a writer in an exchange.

A hen used for breeding, especially for the producer of males to head the breeding pens the next season, should not only be expected to lay a large number of eggs per year, but these eggs should be high in hatching power and the chicks should live, and, furthermore, they should develop into good-sized birds quickly and the pullets should lay well. Perhaps it might be well to give here the method that is used by us in breeding from selected layers.

The hen is required to be a good winter layer and to lay at least 150 eggs in her pullet year. The next requirement is that her eggs hatch well—that is, it is expected that over 80 per cent of the eggs will be fertile and 80 per cent of the fertile eggs will hatch. It is then required that 90 per cent of the chicks will live to five months of age and that the cockrels at this age be well developed and weigh—if from general purpose breeds—at least six pounds each, and, finally, that the pullets be good layers. If the pullets lay well during the fall, then I consider holding their brothers as breeders. We try as far as possible to test the males along similar lines, as to producers of plenty of strong pullets and lay well. There is probably as much difference between males as there is between females.

Catawba's Progressive Farmers.

Hickory has just shipped a solid carload of eggs to New York. Those Catawba county farmers, with their co-operative creamery and their poultry business operated on the same plan are doing a good thing not alone for themselves but for the state. Their example could be followed with profit by other counties in the state.—Raleigh Evening Times.

Ben W. Hooper, the first republican governor elected in Tennessee for three decades, announces he will stand for re-election. Reviewing his administration's achievements he says he has done his best, in enforcing the state-wide liquor laws, but proposes additional legislation to deal with promiscuous indifference to anti-liquor statutes. Hooper says every open saloon in the state can be driven out if the legislature backs him up.
