nounces that Judge Justice will nounces that Judge Justice will not call for a second primary, but, the best interests of the democratic party, will not ask the democrats to go to the polls again. Judge Justice also offers congratulations to Senator Weaver and pledges his earnest support to the successful nominee in the November elections. Official returns from the Tenth district were received by The Citizen vesterday, and show the votes of the various candidates as follows: Zebulon Weaver, 4,583; Judge M. H. Justice, 3,074 ; Sol. Gallert, 2,
043; Frank S. Hewitt, 803 . This 043 ; Frank S. Hewitt, 803. This
makes the total vote cast for congressman in the Tenth district 10,503, with 5,252 necessary to nominate. Mr. Weaver lacked just 669 votes of having the necessary number, but his plurality over Judge Justice, his next nearest opponent, was 1,059 votes.
