Weaver Carried County by 273 Majority; Millard Poteat Has Largest Majority,

Gov. Cox carried McDowell County in the election Tuesday, Nov. 2, by a majority of 248, while Senator Overman defeated A. E. Holton by 249 votes, the final totals in county tabulation shows. Millard G. Poteat, Democratic candidate for county treasurer, received the highest vote of any of the Democratic candidates, defeating his Republican opponent by a majority of 512. McDOWELL COUNTY TEACH-ERS JOIN ASSEMBLY.

Eighty-five of the McDowell conuty teachers are enrolled as members of the North Carolina Teachers' Assembly in the local unit. This number of local teachers gives McDewell county unit seven votes in the business sessions of the Assembly and nine delegates to the Assembly. Miss Mary Greenlee, local secretary, has forwarded the membership fees to the State Secretary asking that proper receipts be issued and forwarded to the teachers.

At a meeting on last Saturday, delegates were elected who are expected to attend the sessions of the Assembly which meets in Asheville on November 25. The delegates attend all the business sessions and there cast the vote of the McDowell unit. The following were appointed delegates: N. F. Steppe, D. F. Giles, T. A. Holton, G. B. Strickland, Miss Mary Greenlee, Miss Blanche Penny, Miss Mary Potest, Miss Celestia Penny and T. A. Wpody.

It is expected that a large number of the county teachers will attend the assembly. To allow this the Board of Education rules that all teachers who attend the Assembly will be given Thursday and Friday of Thanksgiving week as holidays with full pay. A number of teachers have signified their intention of attending and it is expected that Me-Dowell will be well represented.
