DOUGHNUTS!
 There is nothing more wholesome and delightful than doughnuts or crullers, rightly made.

Doughnuts
 3 tablespoons shortening
 1 cup sugar
 1 egg
 1/2 cup milk
 1 teaspoon nutmeg
 1 teaspoon salt
 3 cups flour
 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

Cream shortening, add sugar and well-beaten egg; stir in milk, add nutmeg, salt, flour and baking powder, which have been sifted together, and enough additional flour to make dough stiff enough to roll. Roll out on dough-board to about 1/4 inch thick; cut out by a deep fat hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 60 seconds. Drain on unglazed paper and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Crullers
 4 tablespoons shortening
 1 cup sugar
 2 eggs
 3 cups flour
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
 1/2 cup milk

Cream shortening, add sugar and well-beaten eggs; stir in flour, cinnamon and salt, and enough additional flour to make dough stiff enough to roll. Roll out on dough-board to about 1/4 inch thick; cut out by a deep fat hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 60 seconds. Drain on unglazed paper and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

MAKE APPEAL FOR ORPHANS OF STATE

One Day For Orphans' Movement Will Be Used Again This Season.

The publicity committee of the North Carolina Orphan Association has issued its appeal to the people of the State to contribute during the coming Thanksgiving season something to the support and maintenance of the orphans of the State.

The "One Day for the Orphans" movement was inaugurated several years ago and it has been a wonderfully successful means of bringing to the attention of the citizens of the state the duty they owe the wards of society. The object of the movement is not particularly to care for the orphans who are already in the various institutions in North Carolina, but to make it possible for these institutions to reach out and take in the thousands who can not be accommodated.

In order that more adequate equipment and support might be provided for the fatherless and motherless children of the State, the "One Day for the Orphans" movement has started, calling upon all our people to add to the stream of regular contributions a special Thanksgiving offering equal to a day's income. This is a reasonable request, for anyone can share with the orphans the earnings of one day out of 365. It is practicable, for rich and poor alike can participate in it. It enlists our people of all creeds and classes in beautiful co-operation for the support of a needed civic and Christian philanthropy. While it deposits a handsome aggregate in the orphanage treasuries, it also deepens and enriches the life of our people.

"The cry of the orphan—who can hear it unmoved? And whose heart does not thrill with joy at the thought of the twenty-one orphanages in North Carolina housing many hundreds of dependent children and training them into individual efficiency and good citizenship? Yet everyone of the splendid institutions needs better equipment and larger support, and every one of them is besieged by applicants for admission, which must be denied for lack of means. And, as a matter of fact, in this good State of ours there are literally thousands of orphan children, dependent and deserving, who must be handicapped for life, unless in their tender years they can have the shelter care and culture offered in our orphanage homes.

"Make your offering on or about Thanksgiving Day. Make it on the basis of your earning capacity for a single day—more, if you will; less if you can do no better. Make it through your church or lodge, or send it direct to the orphanage of your choice. Make it with the prayer that our orphan children may be led into the larger life here and the life eternal hereafter."

STATE LITERARY BODY TO HOLD MEETING IN RALEIGH

Raleigh Nov. 11.—The twentieth annual session of the North Carolina State Literary and Historical association will be held in Raleigh on December 2 and 3. At the same time, according to custom, the North Carolina Folk Lore society will hold its eighth annual meeting. The programs of both societies are complete and give promise of even more than usual interest.

During the twenty years of its existence the Literary and Historical association has made a record of achievement of which its members are very proud. It has had much to do with the encouragement of literary effort and with stimulating historical study and investigation. Those are its chief aims.
