REPORT ON CREDIT UNIONS REFLECTS STEADY GROWTH

A steady growth of credit unions in North Carolina is shown by the last report issued by the North Carolina of Markets. Resources have increased about \$48,000 since October 1, 1919, and now exceed \$100,000.

There are now 33 credit unions in the state, with a total membership of 1,387. In view of the present situation in the money market and with declining prices, the Division of Markets expect an increased interest in credit unions which provide funds for farmers operating small farms.

ROBBERS THROW SAFE OFF CAR; RECOVERED

Columbia, S. C., Nov. 11.—The express messenger's safe on train No. 36, Choarlotte division of the Southern railway was thrown off at Sharpe, a station about 15 miles from Columbia today by train robbers, who held up the messenger. The safe contained about \$16,000. Before the bandits could get back to the place where the safe was thrown off, the crew of a freight train passing the spot recovered the safe.

COMPENSATION BILL TO BE CONSIDERED IN N. C.

Raleigh, Nov. 10.—At the August special session of the general assembly a joint resolution provided for a special commission to investigate and report a workmen's compensation bill at the next regular session of the 1921 general assembly. This committee or commission is composed of the following: On the part of the senate, Lindsay C. Warren, Washington; Dorman Thompson, Statesville. On the part of the house, Luke H. Young, Leicester; R. B. Redwine, Monroe; Brownlow Jackson, Hendersonville.

Commissioner Young, in anticipation of the organization of the joint commission, has secured and has for their services a digest of every law enacted in the United States and territories, with annotations. He also has for their use, pamphlet copies of what are considered the most modern and workable laws suited to Southern States, those of Georgia and Virginia, with amendments up to July 1, 1920. The Virginia law, with amendments, he thinks especially adapted to North Carolina, since he says it means after experience, the very latest workable measure. Of the five members of this committee Luke H. Young, of Buncombe, is the only one who is a member of the incoming general assembly one of the others standing for re-election.

JUDGE MANNING WILL AID IN DRAFTING ROAD BILL

Charlotte, Nov. 10.—Judge James S. Manning, re-elected last week as attorney general for North Carolina, and a former justice of the North Carolina supreme court, has agreed to assist the legislative committee of the Citizens' highway association of North Carolina in drafting the bill to provide means of constructing a statewide system of hard surfaced highways in the state, to be presented to the general assembly in January, Colonel T. L. Kirkpatrick, chairman, announced today.

The importance of this bill, which is intended to provide sufficient funds for building a hard surfaced system inter-connecting every county seat and principal town of North Carolina, is considered so important that Colonel Kirkpatrick decided to ask Judge Manning, a man familiar with the law and the requirements, to assist the committee he has already named to draw the bill.

The legislative committee, as named by Chairman Kirkpatrick, includes the following: Heriot Clarkson, Charlotte, chairman; Judge Jeter C. Pritchard, Asheville; R. A. Doughton, Sparta; T. C. Bowie, Jefferson; D. G. Brummitt, Oxford; A. D. Ward New Bern; Colonel John D. Langston, Goldsboro; O. Max Gardner, Shelby; Walter L. Colhoon, Elizabeth City; M. D. Mills, Wilson; Major J. W. Little, Wilmington.

PRESIDING ELDERS HOLD MEETING.

Salisbury, Nov. 11.—The presiding elders of the Western Carolina Methodist conference met in the Empire hotel parlor here and planned for a vigorous campaign to get pledges on the centenary paid up to date. With the elders there met Dr. Ricks, former pastor of Tulip Street church Nashville; R. M. Courtney, conference missionary secretary, and Rev. R. J. Parker, returned missionary from Cuba.

After a full discussion it was decided that an earnest effort should be made to get all pledges paid to date. The week of December 6th has been set aside as pay-up week on all stations and the whole month of December will be used on the country charges. There is due to date on centenary pledges in this conference \$638,745, and of this amount there has been paid \$373,284.
