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R. E. BRADLEY FATALLY INJURED BY AUTOMOBILE

Struck Near His Home at Marion Mill Monday - Car Dirven by W. C. Burgin.

E. Bradley, aged sixty-five years was fatally injured near his herne in the Marion Manufacturing ompany's village early Monday morning, when he was struck by an automobile driven by W. C. Burgin. He was picked up and hurried to town for medical attention, but died before he could be given any atten-

According to reports, Mr. Bradley was returning from work in the Marion mill, and in some way got in the path of the machine, being killed almost instantly. The reports as to how the accident occurred are conflicting. Burgin will be given hearing Friday to determine whether he is responsible for the accident.

OF ASHEVILLE PASSES Asheville, April 10. - Federal Judge Jeter Conley Pritchard, of the fourth district, died here this morning at 6 o'clock, following an illness of several months. Death of the famous jurist was due directly to pneumonia, which developed Thursday, and served to aggravate his previous physical afflictions. He was in his 64th year.

For more than 48 hours previous to his death, he had been unconscious, and while medical experts exerted every effort to save his life, the disease continued to fasten its grip.
