Each farmer should prepare a list like the following and fill in with the number of acres planted or intended after each item. Fractions of acres should be given on small field crops. The total size of the farm, including woods, is essential: Total land, cultivated land; corn; cotton; tobacco; Irish potatoes; sweet potatoes; wheat rye for grain; for hay; soy beans for grain; for hay; clover, all; all crops cut for hay last year; all field truck; home gardens; number hives of bees; fruit trees in bearing; number horses and mules worked; and total tons commercial fertilizers to be used in vices at Dysartsville on May 15, the 1921.
