# MR. PHILLIP K. LAIL

DIED FROM ACCIDENT Mr. Phillip K. Lail, brother of John T. Lail, of this community, was killed in a run-away accident near Spokane, Washington, one day last week. News of the tragedy reached the relatives of the deceased who immediately undertook to get the details of the accident. It seems that Mr. Lail was engaged in managing a farm in Washington and that a team which he was driving became frightened and ran away, killing the driver.

Mr. Lail was a young man, unmarried, and was about 28 years of age. He was a member of the American Legion, and saw service during the World War. His untimely passing brought sorrow to the hearts of his relatives and friends in McDowell and other sections.

The remains are being brought to North Carolina and will be buried near Glen Alpine.

# WILL START TROOPS FROM

RHINE WITHIN TWO WEEKS Washington, Oct. 22 .- The gradual withdrawal of American troops from Germany, expected to start within two weeks, will involve a reduction of the American forces there to about one-half of the present strength of 13,500 officers and men. The reduction will be accomplished by the middle of next March.
