ROAD COMMISSIONERS SELL HIGHWAY BONDS

Premium on County Bonds for Roads Sold Monday Will Amount to About \$8,000.

At a meeting of the County Highway Commission last Monday road bonds were sold. Sidney Spitzer & Co., of Toledo, Ohio, were the purchasers and the price paid was one of the highest ever offered for county bonds. The premium will amount to something like \$8,000.00 which means that the bonds brought more than 5 per cent. above par. The money will be used to continue the work of road building which the commission has on foot. Good roads have already been built through several sections of the county, but the present commission is in favor of a system of roads throughout the entire county that will meet the demands of every section.

The Highway Commission is composed of Mr. Hugh F. Little, chairman; Mr. R. P. Morris, secretary, and Mr. W. P. Artz. They are men of big business affairs personally, but are patriotic and believe in giv-

At the end of the first half of the game, Marion scored 10, and the deaf boys 5. Marion clearly outclassed the deaf boys, and but for the many fouls would have won. Out of the 15 fouls made by Marion, the deaf boys only missed 2, Marion being able to shoot only 4 out of 12. The Marion team was leading 20 to 19, and only 15 seconds to play in, when a goal from the field by the deaf center broke the hearts of the Marionites.

The whole Marion team played star basketball. McMahan's and Sprinkle's shooting, and Copeland's floor work featured, while Atkins and Hipps can't be beat at guarding. The deaf boys put up a great game and played winning ball, their ability to shoot fouls being responsible for their victory.
