OLD FORT SAID TO BE ASSURED COTTON MILL

successful year last Friday when the Site Is Said to Have Already Been Purchased for \$180,-000 Plant to Be Located There.

> A cotton mill with 8,000 spindles and looms for making gingham is practically assured for Old Fort, it was learned here a few days ago. Cost of the proposed mill will be approximately \$180,000.

Property for the mill site is said to have been purchased at an economical figure and electric power will be available at a nominal rate.

Subscriptions for stock amounting to \$130,000 have already been received, it was stated by one of those interested in the new enterprise for Old Fort. Around \$60,000 worth of stock is now on the market.

Among those interested and who have subscribed in the larger amounts are: D. W. Adams, P. H. Mashburn, J. S. Bradley, Dr. J. B. Johnson, G. W. Sandlin and C. L. Lackey, of Old Fort; C. F. James of Marion; J. G. Stikeleather and Holmes Bryson, of Asheville, and Messrs. Chamberlain, of Charlotte, and Snyder, of Hickory. A large number of citizens of Old Fort are said to have subscribed for stock and are anxious that the mill be constructed at an early date.

Maximum, 66 degrees; minimum, 27 degrees; rain, 1.26 inches; sunshine, per cent, .78.
