DISTRICT MEDICAL SO-CIETY MEETS IN MARION

The Medical Association of the Tenth District of North Carolina held its annual meeting in Marion on last Wednesday, April 12th. Dr. G. S. Kirby, the president of the association, and his friends and associates had arranged for the large number of visiting Doctors to hold their meeting at the Conley Club House of the Western Carolina Power Company on Lake James. The day was ideal, clear and warm. The visitors were met and taken by automobiles to the Club House and the meeting was called to order at 11 o'clock by the president. Mr. J. W. Winborne, of the local bar, delivered the address of welcome. Dr. J. F. Toole, of Asheville, responded in happy fashion, expressing great delight for the reception accorded the association.
