

**NEWS ITEMS FROM OVER THE STATE**

**Items Concerning Events of Interest and Importance Throughout the State.**

Statesville.—The fox hunters of Rowan, Wilkes and Alexander counties are invited to join the fox hunters of Irede in a community day picnic to be held at Cool Springs on Wednesday, August 30.

Greensboro.—Mrs. Lou Thacker celebrated her 111th birthday at the home of her grand-daughter, Mrs. J. M. Edmundson, of the Proximity mill village whom she is visiting.

Rocky Mount.—Charlie Rowland, the popular and hard-hitting catcher of the Tar Heels, has been sold to the Philadelphia Athletics, according to a statement made by the local baseball club.

Dunn.—Plans for the completion of Dunn's paving project, started in 1916, and on which work was stopped after asphalt reached so high a price, are now under consideration by the board of commissioners who hope soon to resume paving.

Statesville.—Statesville is to have another modern hospital. The new enterprise will be known as the Davis hospital and is being promoted by Dr. James W. Davis, who has been associated with the Carpenter-Davis hospital as general surgeon for the past two years.

Greensboro.—Graham Nance, young white man, was badly hurt on a street when a motorcycle he was riding collided with an automobile driven by J. B. Ingram. He was taken to a hospital where it is thought he will recover.

Charlotte.—Many of the several hundred textile plants of the Carolinas will be closed down within the next ten days or two weeks, on account of the inability to secure coal, in the opinion of David Clark, editor of the Southern Textile Bulletin, who has just completed a tour and survey of manufacturing centers in the two states.

Wilmington.—Jack Lewis and Bruce Griffith, attempting a trans-continental flight from Atlanta to Los Angeles, via Wilmington, Washington and Cincinnati, had a narrow escape when the airplane in which they were flying made a forced landing in a cotton field near Lumberton. The engine stalled at an altitude of 6,000 feet and was wrecked in landing.

Tarboro.—Tarboro's two auction warehouses for the sale of leaf tobacco

opened here with sales of \$5,000 lbs. at an average of \$24.20 per hundred lbs.

Asheville.—Josiah Norton is dead and Grant Sams, a young man, is being held in the Madison county jail at Marshall as a result of a shooting several nights ago in the Shelton-Laurel section. No motive has been assigned for the deed.

Charlotte.—The Noll Construction company was awarded the contract for paying seven miles on the Yorkville road at approximate cost of \$186,000. The road is to be the same type of construction as the Camp Greene road. There were three bids.

Greensboro.—The Southeastern Passenger association, Atlanta, Ga., announces reduced passenger fares for the American Legion convention, department of North Carolina, to be held here September 8 and 9.

Goldsboro.—The boll weevil and water covers the finest cotton crops in Wayne county. For thirty days the water has been standing in the finest cotton fields in the county. B. C. Thompson, the largest cotton buyer in the county, said.

Greensboro.—Claude Schofield, a young white man of Guilford county, was convicted in the Guilford superior court of swindling the American Exchange National bank here out of ten thousand dollars last April by means of a forged check.

Wake Forest.—Mrs. Bettie Stell, of the cotton mill district of Wake Forest, was instantly killed here when she was struck by Seaboard train No. 11. The train struck her about a mile from the Wake Forest station and opposite the Royal cotton mill.

Durham.—Local authorities have been unable to find a clue as to the identity of the mother of a pretty four-months-old baby left at the door of Dr. E. H. Bowling's office in the Greer building. The baby is in the local Salvation Army home, where it will receive temporary care.

Charlotte.—The News Publishing Co. has just collected an advertising bill for \$7.50 made in 1901, just 21 years ago October 20. The bill was part of the costs of a commissioner's sale of a piece of property in the city which, for some reason or other was allowed to remain pending in the courts until recently when the owners, desiring to make a sale of the real estate, went to clear the title to the land and found that the costs of this sale had never been paid.

**TOWN ORDINANCE**

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Marion, N. C. Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to engage in roller-skating, or the riding of Kiddie-Kars, Skeeter Wagons, Express Wagons, velocipedes, tricycles, or other means of transportation used by children in their play, between the curbs of any of the paved streets in the Town of Marion, or on either sidewalk on Main Street between the Wrenn Building at the corner of State Street, and the First Baptist church at the corner of Church Street.

Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section, or the parents of any child, under the age of sixteen years, allowing their said child to violate any of the provisions of this Act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine in the sum of five (\$5.00) dollars for each and every offense. Violation on each day shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its adoption. Adopted by unanimous vote of the Board of Aldermen, August 21, 1922.
