On a similar endeavor, one and one-fifth miles of sidewalks have been paved. Sidewalks and streets to be properly utilized need curbs and gutters. Five and one-half miles of curbs and four and two-fifths miles of gutters are listed among the construction accomplishments.

Creeks and rivers, in many points, needed bridges. The score there is nine. Roadside landscaping has been performed on one and one-half miles while 244 culverts have been installed. Nearly a mile of road drainage pipe has been laid.
