McDowell Goes Over The Top In

Report \$75,000 In Excess Of War Loan Campaign.

J. F. Snipes and J. N. Morris, cochairmen for the Fourth War Loan Drive for McDowell county have issued an announcement to the effect that the quota of \$380,000 set for McDowell county has been reached and over-subscribed to the amount of approximately \$75,000.

Both Mr. Snipes and Mr. Morris were very high in their praise for the cooperation they had received in this work from the various committees appointed by civic organizations of the city. "The work of the ladies in this drive deserves special mention," said one of the chairmen in discussing the results of the drive.

The schools of the city and county also come in for a part of the credit. Not only did the teachers and pupils buy to the limit during the drive, but school children constantly reminded their parents that an extra bond should be bought during the campaign.

Of the quota of \$380,000 set for the county \$194,000 of this amount was to be in "E" bonds. For awhile it appeared that there might be some difficulty in reaching this objective, but the public in general gave their full support to the end that more than \$200,000 of the total HERMAN CROUCH PUT bonds sold were purchased in the "E" series.
