Light Vote Expected; U. S. Senator, Governor And Others To Be Nominated.

Democratic leaders here predict one of the lightest votes in recent years in the primary to be conducted next Saturday. Few party leaders expect the number of votes cast in McDowell county to exceed 2,000, while some place the total below this figure.

Important factors which will bear on the number of votes cast is no contest for county offices, gasoline terest in politics attributed to the war

In the primary two years ago, with two for county offices, a total of 3,906 votes were cast in this county.


