#### TIRE QUOTA OF ALL TYPES FOR MONTH OF SEPTEMBER REDUCED

The tire board of the local War Price and Rationing office states of High School that the tire quota for tires of all types has been reduced. It was pointed out that one reason for the reduction in quota is due to the fact that the allotment of tires for the past several months has been rather liberal, comparatively speaking, and that all tires alloted to applicants have been exhausted.

> It is the belief of officals of the local War Price and Rationing board that the reduced quota of tires is sufficient to meet the actual needs of the motoring public, provided that complete cooperation from automobile owners is given to the tire board. To this end the tire board urges that automobile and truck owners request tire replacements only when absolutely neces-

.The tire shortage is not over and every automobile and truck owner should observe every rule that will tend to conserve tires. The driver should certainly stay within speed limitations and not exceed thirtyfive miles per hour.
