CERTAIN FOODS NOT RATIONED BUT STILL UNDER PRICE CONTROL

Removal of several processed foods from rationing September 17 does not mean that these items will be removed from price control, according to information released from the local office of the War emphasized that it was not likely that these items, or other basic foods, would be lifted from price control any time soon.

Processed foods to be removed from rationing include jams and jellies, fruit butters and the following canned vegetables and related products: asparagus, fresh lima beans, corn, peas, pumpkin or or puree, soups and baby foods.
