

Other pressing needs which will be taken up later include: A 4year State Medical School and Hospital; new regional and added county hospitals; rural clinics and health centers; extensions of school and public health work.

Yes, the needs are clear and undisputed. The next topic is what is this State's proposed plan or solution, and that will come in next week's article.
