# **Building Program For Hospital** Is Launched By Hospital Board

Three Year Plan Calls For fund would be allowed as a tax de-**Construction Of New Build**ing At Cost Of \$150,000.

The Board of Trustees of the Marion General Hospital have voted Over 300 Attended unanimously to launch a drive to raise funds for the construction of a new hospital or an addition to the present building, according to announcement yesterday.

The present building was constructed in 1929 as a 30 bed hospital, and has been badly overcrowded for the past several years with as many as 54 patients on the roster at times. Large numbers of patients have been forced to go elsewhere or do without hospital facilities.
