Listed below are the boys that are taking orders now for red squill given the support of the public schools, and are taking down the names and addresses of all the people interested in killing their rats, and wish to buy the poison. The red squill is being packaged 1.6 oz. to the bag, a sufficient amount of poison for one pound of meat or fish. The cost of the poison will be 20c, an amount thought by the county agent to be a sufficient amount to kill all the rats on the average sized farm. Poison may be ordered from one of these boys or direct from the county agent's office. Some of the boys listed are 4-H club boys and some of them are FFA members.
