1,921 Polio Cases Reported In State

Raleigh, Sept. 7. - North Carolina's polio epidemic reached 1,921 cases since the first of the year when the state board of health today reported 29 cases for the three-day period since Saturday.

Thirteen of the cases were of September onset, while the other 16 originated last month. No deaths were reported. The September cases total now stands at 15 and that for August at 634.
