

**Varied Docket
In County Court**

The docket of County Court in session here Tuesday was composed of varied charges.

J. S. Lockaby, of Morganton, was given a preliminary hearing on an embezzlement charge, probable cause found and defendant was bound over to the January term of McDowell County Superior Court. Bond was set at \$1,000.

Mrs. R. G. Padgett plead guilty to a bad check offense and was sentenced to six months in jail and assigned to work by the Woman's Division of the State Highway and Public Works Commission, sentence suspended and defendant placed on probation for two years.

Ralph Jamison, possession, was sentenced to eight months on the roads. Defendant appealed and bond was set at \$750.

A judgment of non-suit was rendered in the case of F. Z. Kuykendall, speeding and reckless driving. William Moody, reckless driving, was sentenced to 60 days on the roads, suspended on payment of \$25 and costs.
