## Social Security Benefits Paid Totals 305

There were 305 persons in Mcbenefits from the Social Security Administration during 1948, according to announcement by D. W. Lambert, manager of the administration field office in Asheville.

Of this number, 163 or 53 per cent are women and children. Of the women and children, 13 are widows over age 65; 19 are widows with been the custom for the past few children under age 18 in their care, and 131 of the persons receiving monthly benefits are children under

"Most people think of Social Security as something that concerns old age alone," Lambert said, "but approximately 60 per cent of all the benefits paid under this program in the United States as a whole go to the wives, widows and children of deceased wage earners who worked in employment covered by the provisions of the law."

In the Western North Carolina area, which includes 17 counties, there are 4,343 people receiving monthly payments and of this total, 2,392 of them are women and children, or 55 per cent of the total number of persons receiving monthly benefits. Of these 2,392 people, 219 are aged widows over 65 years of age; 386 are widows with children under 18 years of age: and 1,787 of these monthly benefits are paid to children under age
