



Marauders Defeat Rutherfordton 12 To 9

The Marion Marauders made it two in a row off the Rutherford County Owls Tuesday night as they defeated the Owls in the home park by the score of twelve to nine. In racking up the victory the Marauders touched four visiting pitchers for fourteen hits.

The game was stacked with thrills from beginning to end but both teams played loose ball at times and bursts of greatness were spasmodic. The Owls started their ace moundsman, Left Haynes but he was forced to give way to McKinney in the fourth, who was soon followed by Kelly and Oats.

Jack Williams drew the starting assignment for the Marauders, but he was a bit wild as he had difficulty in finding the plate. He forced in one man by the free route as he walked three batters in a row in the third. Williams was relieved by Odell Griffin in the fourth who received credit for the win. Lefty Odell Griffin has been with the Marauders less than a week and already has credit for a pair of wins. His first one came Monday night as his club defeated the Owls in Rutherfordton six to five. It was another relief job and big Phil Oats was the losing pitcher.

Two homers were made, one in the fifth and the other in the sixth. Each circuit clout accounted for two runs. Bobby Halkard has credit for the first and Art Billie claims the second.

Ezio Bonnetti led at bat for the Marauders with two for three. He was closely pushed by Art Billie who had two out of five trips to the plate. For the Owls Evans, Duncan and Lovett each had two. The line score:




