APPLICATION APPROVED FOR HOSPITAL ADDITION

An application for an addition to the Marion General Hospital was approved last week by the Medical Care Commission subject to the availability of federal funds.

W. L. Morris, chairman of the Board of Trustees, said the J. E. Sirrine company of Greenville, S. C. had been employed as architects. The company is now preparing tentative plans for a 25 bed addition and alterations to the old building to be submitted to the State Medical Care Commission within 30 days. If approved, architects would proceed with drawing the plans for approximately 90 days and bids would then be opened for construction of the proposed addition.

The new 25 bed wing would give Marion a 62 bed hospital.
