Hemp McNeely Fatally Injured Friday Night

Hemp McNeely of Cross Mill was fatally injured Friday night when struck by a truck driven by Jack N. Smith, of Asheville, and owned by the Bon Ton Distributing company. State Highway Patrolman Archie Burrell who investigated, said Smith will face charges of manslaughter at a hearing scheduled

Friday. He was released under \$1,000 bond.

The incident occurred about nine o'clock on highway 70 approximately one mile west of Marion. Burrell said Smith told him McNeely walked in the path of his truck so close to the vehicle that he could not stop. McNeely died about a half hour af-
