School Superintendent **Issues** Instructions For Safe Bus Transportation

Following the tragic bus accident in Nash county in which seven school children lost their lives and the prompt action of the State school officials and Highway Patrol, instructions were issued from the office of the County Superintendent of McDowell to principals and others responsible for school bus transportation to make a close inspection of bus loading and school transportation in view of determining whether any violations of transportation rules are being permitted in McDowell county School transportation.

N. F. Steppe, county superintendent, outlined the precautions taken as follows:

Ramon Robinson, supervisor of transportation, contacted all school principals and drivers and made a close inspection of loading, bus routing, and other regulations affecting transportation. Strict orders have been given that no overloading must be permitted and that only children entitled to transportation will be given permission to ride school busses. The busses are to be kept in safe mechanical condition and everything possible will **Bicyclist** be done to guarantee the safety of school children. 


