## Junior Womans Club Hears Mrs. Williams

On Tuesday evening Mrs. Garland Williams principal of the Cross Mill school for the past 28 years addressed members of the Marion Junior Womans club on the subject of "Education." Mrs. Williams was introduced by Mrs. W. I. Haithcock, program chairman.

In opening her speech Mrs. Williams spoke of the 2.5 billion dollars spent on education in the United States last year and stated that 32 million children are now enrolled in the schools of America. She read a speech made by Governor Aycock to the North Carolina Legislature in 1900 and stated that the dream of Aycock was being fulfilled.

Mrs. Williams stressed the fact that the whole child must be educated, physically, mentally and spiritually and illustrated her remarks by a humorous reading, from Readers Digest, about a small boys' idea of right from wrong. She quoted that "there are no juvenile delinquents. Behind every so-called delinquent is a parent or a teacher, or both, who have failed." She stated that "Education is absorbed," and closed her talk by reading the lovely poem by Walt Whitman "A Child Went Forth."

Following Mrs. Williams' talk Mrs. P. T. Hollis, president presided over a business session. Mrs. Wade Britt, third vice president of the North Carolina Federation of Womans Club gave a resume of a talk delivered by her to the Junior Womans Club of Canton on Thursday evening of last week. She spoke of her trip to New York City in October and in a most interesting way told of the 18th Herald Tribune Forum held at the Waldorf Astoria. She spoke of hearing such personalities as Margaret Chase Smith, Mrs. Blair Buck, Lucious D. Clay, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., Dwight Eisenhower, Dr. Frank P. Graham, and Heury Cabot Lodge. 
