In part the letter read: "while the Commission's approval is contingent on the provision of a more adequate sewerage line, the site conforms to the Commission's requirement in all other respects and should prodie an excellent location for the proposed new hospital."

The Board will discuss the sewerage problem with the Aldermen within the near future, Morris said. He said adjustments suggested are of a minor nature.

The proposed site is located within the corporate limits of the town of Marion. It is a corner plot, fronting on Fleming Street on the north and North Madison street on the west.
