

"The Way West" by A. B. Guthrie, Jr.,-"The author of 'The Big Sky' tells the stories of fifty people and more in this novel of a wagon train from the peaceful, settled towns and farm lands of the East. Driven westward by various hungers-the longing for new land, the desire to win Oregon for the United States, the wish to escape from the confining and sometimes defeating circumstances of their lives thus far, they form their train, turn the heads of their draft oxen to the west, and begin the long months of one of the great migrations of history."

"That Man from Nazareth" by Harry Emerson Fosdick-A picture of Jesus as others saw him, based on a long and careful study of the Christian and Jewish literature of the time of the Christ and of the emerging Christian Church.
