Great American author and patriot, born in Hanover county, Virginia. His father was a native of Scotland. He received a fair share of classical education, entered business at an early age, married at eighteen. Having failed successfully in "storekeeping" and in farming, he became a lawyer in 1760, and three years later found his opportunity, when, having been employed to plead the cause of the people against so unpopular tax, his great eloquence seemed suddenly to develop itself.

Throughout the war of independence he was a zealous patriot. He was a delegate to the First Continental Congress, which met at Phil-1776 he carried the vote of the Virginia convention for independence; and in the same year he became governor of the new state. He was afterwards four times reelected to his practice; in 1795 he de-

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
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
