Emigration From North Carolina

The Wilmington Star of Thursday, May 2nd, contains a communication on the above subject, written by a "North Carolinian," which gives a truthful cause of our young men seeking other fields, to-wit: "Want of appreciation at home."

But there are still other reasons we arrive at from our own personal knowledge and information. One reason is, that a young man leaving home to seek his fortune among strangers, beyond the influence of his old friends, and the advice and counsel of those to whom he might naturally look for aid, is combatted with the fact that it is "root hog, or die;" and without the fear of ridicule or scorn by those who were his early companions, he puts his shoulder to the wheel and pushes forward in the tide of success. If he succeeds, his praises are published to the world and he is hoisted as a model and considered a very smart man, when in truth the secret of his success is, that he took the tide at the flood, which led to fortune. He may have left a brother behind who in many respects was superior to him in point of intellect, but he had to contend with all the misfortunes and short comings of his name and family through many generations past. The Southern Manufacturers Association and the Georgia Farmers' Alliance gave the death blow the Jute Bagging Trust on Thursday, at Augusta, Ga.

Not the least part of the glory of this achievement, is the fact that the work done was aided by seven cotton manufacturers of North Carolina.

The conference between the Manufacturers' Association and the Farmers' Alliance resulted in practical conclusions that can only mean utter rout to the Jute Bagging Trust.

After the result had been thoroughly canvassed, Maj. J. F. Hanson, of Macon, Ga., offered the following resolution which was adopted.

"Resolved, That the mills represented by the Southern Manufacturers' Association will pay for whatever cotton they consume covered by cotton or other light bagging, weighing 1/2 of a pound to the yard less, ten cents per hundred more than for cotton covered by jute bagging."

At a later meeting of the representatives of the Georgia State Farmers' Alliance who were delegates to the conference with the Southern Manufacturers Association, the following was adopted:

"We have arranged with manufacturers to supply the farmers of this State with cotton bagging, to be guaranteed not less than thirty-seven inches wide, and to average twelve ounces to the yard f. a. b. at the mills. The members of the Manufacturers' Association agree to take cotton so covered at 10 cents additional per one hundred pounds to cover loss by weight in light covering."

To meet the conditions necessary to begin the manufacture, we have contracted with the mills for two million yards of cotton bagging. This contract will not be completed until it is ratified by orders from the Alliances of the State, covering the amount for which we have contracted."

The question of how far cotton bagging is suitable as a substitute for jute bagging, was left to a committee representing the Georgia State Farmers' Alliance, agricultural societies in South Carolina, and the Southern Manufacturing Association. That committee after full deliberation and with ample facts before it, reported as follows:

"First. That in their judgment it is practical to substitute cotton bagging for jute bagging."

Second. That cotton bagging can be manufactured yard for yard at the same or less cost than jute bagging, if it be generally accepted as a covering for cotton bales."

Here, then, is the chance for the North Carolina State Alliance to help to crush out the Jute Bagging Trust. Let the State Alliance determine in addition to so much pine straw bagging, to buy so many yards of cotton bagging. The North Carolina mills were represented at the conference, and they are ready to meet any demands that the State Alliance may make; but whatever is done in North Carolina by the State Alliance, ought to be done at once.—Charlotte Chronicle.

An Act to Change the Time of Holding the Superior Courts of Robeson County.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

SECTION 1. That chapter two hundred and thirty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, fixing the time for holding the Superior Courts of the seventh judicial district, be amended as follows: Strike out all after the word "Robeson" in line four on page four hundred and seventy-five down to and including the word "weeks" in line eight and insert in lieu thereof, "Fifth Monday before the first Monday in March to continue for two weeks; Eleventh Monday after the First Monday in March, to continue for one week, and to be devoted to the trial of criminal cases, trying those first who may be confined in jail for alleged criminal offences and giving precedence always to cases of capital felonies; and civil process of all kinds may be made returnable to this term and all matters of a civil nature not requiring the presence of a jury or the attendance of witnesses may be heard and determined at said term, but nothing herein shall be construed to extend this term of Robeson Superior Court beyond one week, unless the trial of a capital felony be not concluded during the term, in which event, the term shall be extended until said trial is concluded; fourth Monday after the first Monday in September to continue three weeks.

Sec. 2. That said chapter two hundred and thirty-nine be further amended by striking out in line fifteen on said page four hundred and seventy-five the word "sixth" and insert in lieu thereof the word "seventh," so that the Fall term of Bladen Court shall be held on the seventh Monday after the first Monday in September.

Sec. 3. That said chapter two hundred and thirty-nine be further amended by striking out in line twenty-one on said page four hundred and seventy-five the word "seventh" and insert in lieu thereof the word "eighth" so that the Fall term of Moore Superior Court shall be held on the eighth Monday after the first Monday in September.

Sec. 4. That immediately upon the ratification of this act it shall be the duty of the Secretary of State to furnish a copy thereof to the Board of County Commissioners of Robeson County, who shall cause publication thereof to be made in a newspaper published in Robeson County in order to give notice to the changes made herein concerning the Superior Courts of Robeson County.

Sec. 5. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification. Ratified the 9th day of March, A. D. 1889.

Court Marshal.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—The Secretary of the Navy has issued an order reprimanding Lieut. William C. Strong, of the Navy, and approving the finding of the Court Marshal which tried him for drunkenness, neglect of duty, and disobedience of orders, on board the Tallapoussa, at Montevideo, in February last.

The Court Marshal was held at that place, and Lieut. Strong found guilty, and sentenced to be suspended for a period of five years, on half pay, to keep his present number on the list of lieutenants, and to be publicly reprimanded by the Secretary of the Navy.
