As far as yet announced the cabinet of the next administration will be as follows: Walter Q. Gresham, of Illinois, Secretary of State. John G. Carlisle, of Kentucky, Secretary of the Treasury. Daniel S. Lamont, of New York, Secretary of War. Wilson S. Bissell, of New York, Postmaster General. Hoke Smith, of Georgia, Secretary of the Interior. J. Sterling Morton, of Nebraska, Secretary of Agriculture.

In giving the names of the first four of these Mr. Cleveland said: "There is no need of any mystery in regard to the cabinet, and it is useless to speculate and indulge in guess work. I shall make no secret of the matter, but shall announce the names of the gentlemen selected to fill the positions as fast as I receive their acceptances and permission to make the matter public."

Considerable surprise has been expressed that Mr. Cleveland has so far not appointed some of the members of his former cabinet, but it is said by the great majority of good judges that these appointments are able ones. Only two of them are from the South, Carlisle and Smith, and the former, although he lives on this side of the Ohio, yet he can hardly be called a Southern man. Carlisle is regarded as the ablest member of the cabinet. All the members are lawyers save Lamont.

WASHINGTON LETTER. WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 27th. Your correspondent notes from last week's paper that his letter did not reach you. This, Mr. Editor, is no less a source of annoyance to him than to you. It was mailed in time, and the blame attaches in this case to the postal service.

The time of Congress last week was taken up for the most part in considering, amending and passing some of the appropriation bills of which there are thirteen district ones. The fight for the passage of bills this week will make the sessions of Congress very interesting, and the visitor of inauguration week will have before him a scene of unusual activity in both the legislative branches of Congress.

The amount of free gold in the Treasury has been reduced from \$9,000,000 at the beginning of the month to about \$4,000,000 now at command, or perhaps a little less, allowing for Saturday's shipment to Europe. As the spring weather approaches, we may feel a few degrees safer with the additional protection afforded us by the new quarantine law, recently enacted.

The treaty which proposes to annex the Hawaiian islands has been transmitted by the President and Secretary of State to the Senate that body has not yet ratified it. Action upon it may be delayed and the whole matter carried over to the next administration, as the young princess who would become queen on attaining her majority and who has been receiving her education in England for several years, has sailed from the latter country and expects to reach Washington shortly, and lay her claims to the throne before the proper officials. Mr. Cleveland's private secretary will be Henry L. Thurber, of Detroit, Mich. This gentleman is a law partner of Don M. Dickinson, and was tendered the position without solicitation, the President elect, having known him for years and being cognizant of the admirable qualities he possessed as befitting him for the place. A view of the inaugural parade from windows, rooms and balconies on Pennsylvania Ave. is valued at the low figures of from \$15 to \$300 according to place, and space desired. Single seat on stands range

as high as \$4 and \$50 and over. The lowest, is perhaps \$1. Wishing that all your readers, Mr. Editor could witness the great Inaugural Parade, yours respectfully, COLLIER. P. S.—There are a few more tickets to the Inaugural Ball available at \$5 apiece.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 20. The nomination of Judge Howell E. Jackson to the Supreme Court Bench has been confirmed by the Senate. The condition of the gold supply in the Treasury has been some what relieved this week by heavy receipts by the government and a considerable falling off in the shipment of that metal.

The Senate on motion of Mr. Sherman of Ohio has passed a bill to authorize the Secretary of the Treasury, should it be necessary, to issue 5 year 3 per cent. bonds, redeemable after the end of that period, for the redemption of legal tender notes, the amount of these bonds not to exceed \$50,000,000. Both Houses of Congress are behind in passing appropriation bills, and it is likely there will be some lively legislation before the end of next week.

Ex-Senator Carlisle, who spent Saturday at Lakewood with Mr. Cleveland, is quoted as saying that there would be no extra session of Congress. The officials of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad have tendered a train of cars for the accommodation of the President and family and friends to Washington for the inauguration. It is the purpose of the party to make trips on the night of the 28th inst.

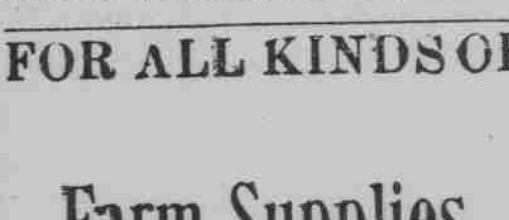
