In his address Governor McLean made a strong appeal to Rotarians of the county to take the lead in some movement to bring about better conditions in the county, especially better agricultural conditions. Robeson in common with other North Carolina counties, he said, faces the problem of whether or not to abandon cotton entirely in view of the fact that Texas and Oklahoma can produce the staple at a cost of about 8 cents as arainst cost here of about 20 cents the pound. There is a great agricultural problem to solve, he said, and business conditions have not been good.
