Census Taking Started Wednesday

Enumeration of the 1930 census of the United States started yesterday. Census takers of Robeson county met in the court house Saturday and were instructed in their duties by Mr. W. C. Downing of Fayetteville, supervisor of the 11th district. Population of incorporated towns

will be first enumerated, and it is expected that this information will be in the hands of the supervisor by April 15. 
